56 THINGS YOU ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT YOUR TIN SHEET

Ways to use the keyboard side

- 1. find the groups of 2 black notes
- 2. find the groups of 3 black notes
- 3. find other white notes and name them
- 4. show music patterns on white keys (standing still, stepping up, stepping down...)
- 5. tell a story using characters that have names starting with letters of the white keys on the keyboard and have students find the letters named
- 6. sing a pattern of notes and have students make the pattern on their tin sheets
- 7. show different chords, or scales, or triads
- 8. use as a tool for working on melodies
- 9. use as a tool for harmony work
- 10. back up concepts learned in theory work
- 11. show high and low pitches
- 12. show a pattern repeating and have it move up or down
- 13. sing a pattern of notes and have the student make it and then move it to another key (i.e. transpose)
- 14. Use for ear training concepts for exam preparation

Ways to use the Staff Side

- 15. Work on naming white keys
- 16. Work on pattern identification and construction
- 17. Melodic dictation
- 18. Work on composition concepts repetition, sequence, octave displacement, retrograde, inversion, augmentation, diminution, fragmentation, answer
- 19. Show chords on the staff
- 20. Harmonic dictation
- 21. Reinforce theory concepts
- 22. Reinforce ear training skills
- 23. Tell a story and have student find note names for characters in the story
- 24. Use to play excerpts composed on tin sheet
- 25. Use as a flash card concept
- 26. Use to practice theory of making scales
- 27. Use to make intervals in music (distances from one note to the next)
- 28. Use for ear training concepts for exam preparation

WHERE TO USE IT:

- 29. in class
- 30. in the waiting area while waiting for class to start
- 31. in the car
- 32. during television commercials
- 33. at the table while waiting for a meal to begin
- 34. at bedtime as a quiet activity
- 35. at the piano
- 36. on the floor or other flat surface

WHAT TO USE ON THE TIN SHEET:

- 37. MYC® issued magnets
- 38. Round cereal pieces
- 39. Round coloured candy
- 40. Little hearts
- 41. Washers
- 42. Seasonal confetti pieces (i.e. pumpkins, trees etc.)

TIN SHEET GAMES:

- 43. Roll a die with note names
- 44. Roll a die with critter pictures
- 45. Use a deck of cards with note names. Draw from the deck and put at appropriate place.
- 46. Have note names or critter pictures on little pieces of paper in a plastic container. Draw out a slip and place magnet accordingly on tin sheet.
- 47. Write a melody on the staff
- 48. Write three important chords on tin sheet. Name the key to which they belong.
- 49. Ring toss game board
- 50. Spinners with letter names, line/space numbers, critters

WHY USE YOUR TIN SHEET:

- 51. It is a fast way of finding keys, placing notes and new scales etc...
- 52. It works for children and adults who have difficulty with fine motor control
- 53. It is easy to change a placement if it needs correcting
- 54. It is portable
